Preserving Culture Through Radio

"Coming Home: the Return of the Alutiiq Masks"

Anchorage, AK- History comes to life with Alutiiq/Sugpiaq drumming and storytelling in the special edition of Koahnic Broadcast Corporation's national program, Earthsongs. This one-hour radio documentary project, set to release in November 2008, stems from a partnership with United States Artists (USA) Rockefeller Fellow and George Peabody Award-Winning Artist, Dmae Roberts and Koahnic's Earthsongs Host and Producer, Shyanne Beatty.

The documentary details the long-awaited return of the Alutiiq Masks from France to Kodiak. In the winter of 1872, a young French anthropologist, Alphonse Pinart, traveled the Kodiak archipelago by kayaq, assembling one of the most extensive collections of Alutiiq ceremonial masks in the world, and brought them back to France. In May 2008, 34 of these Alutiiq ceremonial masks returned to their people and were exhibited at The Alutiiq Museum in Kodiak, Alaska. The documentary will feature the artists who helped make the return possible and interviews with community leaders on the significance of the masks.

This powerful story of reclamation will resonate with communities nationwide. The complex, sound-rich production features triptych storytelling, compelling interviews and music from Kodiak Island where Alutiiq/Sugpiaq peoples are undergoing a cultural renaissance.

In honor of Alaska Native/American Indian Heritage Month, the special edition of Earthsongs will be distributed by Native Voice One (NV1) in November 2008, and will be made available to stations for free. ABOUT UNITED STATES ARTISTS

The founding of USA was prompted by the Urban Institute's breakthrough 2003 study, Investing in Creativity: A Study of the Support Structures for U.S. Artists. This research found that while 96% of Americans appreciate the arts, only 27% believe that artists contribute to the good of society. In addition, the study found the median reported income for artists from their artistic work was only \$5,000 and that more than half of America's 2 million artists pay for their own health insurance. Despite these economic

challenges, artists contribute directly to advancements in the education of young people, the development of a competitive creative economy, and the revitalization of the nation's neighborhoods and urban centers.

In response to these findings, The Ford Foundation, the Rockefeller Foundation, the Prudential Foundation, and the Rasmuson Foundation contributed a total of \$20 million to establish USA as a structure through which private philanthropists, corporate donors, and other foundations can support individual artists. Due to seed funding from its founders, 100% of current donor contributions directly support artists. The USA Fellowship program is envisioned to be funded in perpetuity through income generated by a permanent endowment USA will establish in the coming years. USA annually awards fifty \$50,000 fellowships to artists working in the US in virtually every artistic discipline. Through the generosity of the Rasmuson Foundation, USA Fellows are eligible for AK AIR, a residency program in Alaska. Dmae Roberts was in residence at Koahnic during 2007 and 2008.

Shyanne also blended a daily four hour music show on 90.3 KNBA when she wasn't traveling. She now focuses her time on the daily music show as well as hosting and producing Earthsongs. Shyanne is a singer and volunteers at community events throughout Alaska.

INSIGHTS TO ALASKA NATIVE/AMERICAN INDIAN HERITAGE MONTH

Alaska Native/American Indian Heritage Month officially began in 1990 by a proclamation made by President George Bush. The proclamation is due to the hard work and dedication of many people - Native and non-Native - beginning as early as 1915. The purpose of Heritage Month is to celebrate and recognize the intertribal cultures and to educate the public about the heritage, history, art, and traditions of the original peoples of this land.
